
#### **FEEDBACK REPORT ON CURRICULUM 2022-23**


#### **STUDENT FEEDBACK**

The feedback form, prepared on a five-point Likert Scale hinging on ten qualitative attributes, has been responded to by 971 students as summarised below:


➤ Time Relevance: 73 percent of the respondents "agree" that the curriculum is time-relevant and in synchrony with contemporary academic needs.




➤ **Aspirations and Professional Ambitions**: 74 percent of the respondents endorse the statement that the curriculum supports their aspirations and professional ambitions.




➤ Theory-Application Engagement: The statement on theory-application harmony has been affirmed by 76 percent of the respondents.




➤ **Higher Education Pursuits:** It has been agreed to by 77 percent that the current syllabus promotes higher education pursuits.




➤ **Subject Interest:** 77 percent of the respondents reinforce the statement that the syllabus evokes interest in the subject areas.






➤ Curricular Enrichment: 75 percent of the respondents accept the statement that workshops, seminars, conferences, and industrial visits are curriculum value additions.




➤ Hands-on Exposure: The statement that the 'curriculum offers internship opportunities' has been acknowledged by 69 percent of the respondents.



➤ Research opportunities: 74 percent of the respondents believe that the curriculum opens up research vistas.




➤ Social skills: 73 percent of the respondents concur that the curriculum promotes social skills through cultural and community activities with leadership building opportunities.




## **PARENT FEEDBACK**

The feedback form, prepared on a four-point Likert Scale hinging on nine qualitative attributes, has been responded to by 756 parents as summarised below:


➤ Usefulness of the Curriculum: 85 percent of the respondents accede to the usefulness of the curriculum.




➤ Current Teaching Methods: The teaching methods currently followed are endorsed by 81 percent of the respondents.




➤ **Teacher-student Relationship:** Teacher-taught relationship is stated to be healthy by 83 percent of the respondents.




➤ Conduct of Examinations: 86 percent of the respondents affirm satisfaction with the conduct of examinations.




➤ Co-curricular Activities: Variety and quality of co-curricular activities are confirmed to carry both quality and variety by 81 percent of the respondents




➤ Extracurricular Activities: 77 percent of the respondents remain contended with the breadth of the extra curricular activities provided by the institution.



➤ **Vocational Opportunities:** Vocational possibilities the curriculum offers are confirmed to be bright by 78 percent of the respondents.




➤ Integration of Values and Ethics: The curriculum is stated to be rich in values and ethics by 82 percent of the respondents.




## **TEACHER FEEDBACK**


➤ Curriculum and Institutional Attributes: The curriculum is confirmed to align well with the institutional perspectives by 94 percent of the respondents.




Fulfilment of Programme/Course Outcome: It is agreed by 92 percent of the respondents that the syllabus fully justifies the envisaged programme/course outcome.




➤ Curriculum Structure: 87 percent of the respondents concur that the syllabus is systematically structured and scalable.




➤ Curriculum Framework: The curriculum offers scope for further learning and acquisition of skills as stated by 94 percent of the respondents.




> Syllabus and Global Relevance: It is agreed to by 81 percent of the respondents that the syllabus mirrors current global trends and developments.




➤ Curriculum and Professional Ethics: 85 percent of the respondents endorse that the curriculum inculcates professional ethics and practices.




➤ Curriculum and Social Responsibilities: The curriculum fosters social awareness and responsibilities as corroborated by 77 percent of the respondents.




➤ Curriculum and Teaching-learning: 85 percent of the respondents admit that the curriculum adopts an inclusive approach for active student participation.




➤ Curriculum and Participative Learning: 77 percent of the respondents find that the curriculum embraces cultural hue and triggers leadership attributes.




➤ Curriculum and Competitive Preparedness: The curriculum stokes ambitions and aspirations as indicated by 72 percent of the respondents.




➤ Course Structure: The course/syllabus maintains the equitable presence of theory and practical as endorsed by 83 percent of the respondents.




➤ Curriculum Impact: The curriculum is evocative and generative of subject interest, as affirmed by 84 percent of the respondents.




➤ Curriculum and Research Potential: The curriculum offers significant scope for research as admitted by 81 percent of the respondents.




➤ Curriculum and Career Aspirations: 86 percent of the respondents agree that the curriculum nurtures and nourishes ambitions and vocational aspirations.



➤ Teaching, learning, and Evaluation: 90 percent of the respondents agree that teaching, learning, and evaluation are curriculum-based.




➤ NEP and Curriculum Scalability: Curriculum is supportive of NEP initiatives as reinforced by 68 percent of the respondents.




# **EMPLOYER FEEDBACK**

Feedback received from the employers on a three-point Likert Scale has been consolidated into a diagrammatic representation along with a narration as appended below.


➤ **Professional Competence:** Hundred percent of the respondents admit that the passed-out students carry competence and promise for successful employment.




➤ Technical Knowledge/Skill: A hundred percent of the employers remain satisfied with the technical expertise and skills displayed by these former students.



➤ Creativity/Ingenuity: A vast majority of employers (93 percent) agree that these employees possess sufficient creativity and ingenuous thinking.




➤ Social Responsibility: All employers without exception express satisfaction with the attribute of social responsibility among these employees.




➤ Management and Leadership Qualities: A significant majority of employers (93 percent) agree that such employees display managerial skills and leadership qualities in their work environment.




➤ Communication Skills: All employers voice satisfaction with the communication skills of their employees.




➤ Professional Ethics and Values: Most of the employers (93 percent) remain satisfied with the values and ethics displayed by the employees in their occupational roles.




➤ Overall Impression: Hundred percent of the employers remain contended with the overall functional competence and allied attributes of their employees.



Familiarity with Industry Practices: Most of the employers (93 percent) admit that these employees carry sufficient familiarity with prevailing industry practices in their functional roles.




➤ Outstanding Qualities and Attributes: It has been affirmed by many employers (80 percent) that these employees exceeded their expectations as novices.




## **ACADEMIC PEER FEEDBACK**

Feedback received from the academic peers in its collated version numbering fifty-three is as follows.


➤ Scope of the Curriculum: It has been agreed by 98 percent of the respondents that the curriculum encompasses all subjects of relevance to the program.






➤ Curriculum as an Information Tool: It has been affirmed by 92 percent that the curriculum emphasizes on communication, creation, dissemination, and management of information.






➤ Curriculum Design: 96 percent of the respondents admit that the curriculum centres around student involvement and activities.






➤ Curriculum and Personal Attributes: 91 percent endorse the statement that the curriculum helps enhance personal attributes on the social and moral realms.






➤ Curriculum and Participative Learning: This statement has been endorsed by 91 percent of the academic peers.




➤ Curriculum and Self-reliance: It is affirmed by 89 percent of the academic peers that the curriculum strengthens self-reliance and efficiency.




➤ Curriculum and Occupational Preparedness: 89 percent of the respondents agree that the curriculum prepares the students for vocational roles and challenges.






➤ Relevance of the Curriculum in the Global Scenario: 83 percent of the respondents concur that the curriculum aligns with the emerging global trends.






➤ Curriculum as Research Initiator: 92 percent of the respondents are of the view that the curriculum is evocative of research interest among students.

> Scalability of Curriculum and NEP Guidelines: It has been stated by 77 percent of the respondents that the curriculum well accommodates NEP guidelines.




#### **ALUMNAE FEEDBACK**

alumnae assessment on its academic significance and vocational possibilities. 273 alumnae of the 2021-22 pass-out batch constitute the respondent base.


> Structure and Relevance of Syllabus: 96 percent of the alumnae admit that the syllabus aligns with contemporary needs with sufficient scalability.




➤ Complementary Courses: The Complementary courses offered in conjunction with the mainstream program are mutually enriching, confirm 96 percent of the alumnae.




**Evaluation Practice:** 97 percent of the alumnae endorse appropriateness and fairness adopted in course evaluation.




➤ Topic Relevance in Subjects: It is agreed to by 94 percent of the alumnae that the topics covered under the subjects are time relevant.




➤ Curriculum and Research Aptitude: It is affirmed by 89 percent of the alumnae that the curriculum evokes research aptitude among students.




➤ Curriculum and Employability: It is stated by 81 percent of the respondents that the curriculum nourishes employability prospects.
